CMA DOCENT PROFILE
— Faye Heston —

Faye Heston has always been interested in the arts, "More the performing arts, voice and drama and I've always wanted to learn more," she said. "Being a Docent was a great way to volunteer and teach children. I've been around the museum for forty years now."

"I was recruited years ago. Someone asked me to do it, from the beginning of the Docent program," she reminisced, "I was gone for 15 years when I moved to Chagrin Falls and was a Docent at the Cleveland Museum of Natural History. When I returned in 1995, I rejoined and picked up the pieces".

"I love to do it, it's just fun seeing the children being excited," she said with a smile. Her favorite part of being a Docent is working with the children to help them enjoy art. Especially children from inner city schools, "You hope to enrich their lives and give them the spark. We're not here to control the children, we're here to excite and inspire them."

Docenting requires you to stay current. You make a difference in children's lives and you give back to the community".

She went on to say, "I believe in the arts because it is an integral part of the corporate community. In order to encourage economic development you need quality cultural aspects to entice good corporate leadership that will keep your community strong. The social economic aspect is the bigger picture".

Her last comment was, "People are afraid to Docent; I remember my fear of snorkeling and I could say come get your feet wet. It's beautiful. You just have to take one group of kids to love it".
