



### Director's Spotlight

### Exploring and Finding Home

t is with great excitement and anticipation that I welcome you to our Spring 2023 season, which holds an amazing line-up of exhibitions, events, classes and more. My thanks to you — our members, donors, visitors, students, tourists, and all — for your continued generosity and support of our mission: providing opportunities for everyone to discover, explore, learn, and be inspired through a connection with American art. I look forward to meeting you and welcoming you to the Museum to enjoy and to "connect art to life."

Spring finds us exploring "home" and its meanings. For many, home is a safe place to live and work and love. For others, home is a state of mind, or even a journey, or a dream. In one of our featured exhibitions, *Finding Home: Four Artists' Journeys*, we follow travels from Poland, Mexico, China, and England to the United States and striving to overcome barriers such as language, means, or acceptance. Presented with the Norman Rockwell Museum, *Finding Home* offers us a glimpse into struggles past and all-too present of attaining a place to call our own.

Likewise, in the exhibition *Made Home* we discover the intricate papercut art of Rosa Leff and the artist's worldwide travels. Each of Leff's storytelling creations is cut by hand from a single sheet of paper using a knife. In 2020, Mark Jenkins of *The Washington Post* wrote in a review, "... Leff has what are called, in the world of culinary competition, knife skills." I invite you to take in Leff's skills and to contemplate what her images say to you about time, place, and cultural experiences.

I am very pleased to introduce to you our third spring exhibition, **Borderless: Artist Migration from the CMA Collection.** Borderless takes visitors through the stories and journeys of artists such as Julian Stanczak, Gerrit Beneker, Israel Abramofsky, and others who re-imagined ideas of home and place here in America, and established enduring legacies in American art and culture.

How can you get involved in the storytelling of home, beyond just the exhibitions? Check out page 11 for "You Are What You Bring With You," a call to share your own personal stories through expressive writing, drawing, photos, and more that CMA will share. I encourage you to participate, as your "story" may inspire another — and spark important cross-cultural dialogue.

There is so much happening this spring, and beyond in 2023 and 2024. I am thrilled by our Curatorial Department's vision for upcoming exhibitions, including *Ginny Ruffner: Reforestation of the Imagination*, with the Smithsonian American Art Museum, combining glass sculpture with Augmented Reality (AR) for interactive viewer experiences, as well as themed features from the CMA Collection such as *An American Journey: Watercolor Achievements*, including Alice Schille, John Singer Sargent, and many other noted masters of the medium who have found a home here in Canton. You can also look forward to *Quilt National '23*, the 23rd international juried exhibition showcasing storytelling through quilts; *A New Deal: WPA Artists from the Collection*, focusing on the power of art in bolstering national unity; and more, with guaranteed something for everyone!

Great art(s) strengthen and sustain great communities, and CMA's reputation for artistic excellence and diverse storytelling encourages all to make a deeper engagement with the transformative power of art. It also encourages cultural tourism, reinforcing economic development and cultural significance in our city and region. We welcome all from near and far to discover and experience the Museum, and I look forward to seeing you in the galleries or in the community soon.

Entries were submitted this year from 16 local high schools. An awards ceremony was held at CMA on First Friday, April 7th. The top three winners received a financial award to be used for College enrollment fees-\$2,000 for First Place, \$1,500 for Second Place and \$1,000 for Third Place. Honorable mention awards were also presented to 10 students, with each winner receiving a scholarship for classes at CMA's School of Art.

# FINDING HOME: FOUR ARTISTS JOURNEYS


hat defines home? The circuitous pathways to finding a place of one's own are explored in our upcoming exhibition, *Finding Home: Four Artists' Journeys*, which features compelling visual memoirs inspired by personal journeys through time and place. Master illustrators bring the immigration experience to life in images and words that give voice to the complex emotional realities of traveling to America, and of adapting to a new world thousands of miles away from where their stories began.


More than one hundred-fifty original drawings, paintings, linoleum block prints, and digital mixed media works by artists Frances Jetter, David Macaulay, James McMullan, and Yuyi Morales draw upon memories and family narratives, and on historical research that establishes meaningful contexts for their work. Personal mementos-from treasured toys, skates, and tea sets to articles of clothing, books, photographs, and travel documents, as well as video commentary, will illuminate each illustrator's story. The space that images make to inspire conversation will be explored, as will the distinctive qualities of each artist's voice, their aesthetic and technical approaches, and the use of visual symbols as anchors in their poignant sequential narratives.

Frances Jetter's *Amalgam* is an illustrated history of the life and times of her immigrant labor unionist grandfather, who left Poland in 1911 when it was still part of the Russian Empire.

After arriving at Ellis Island, he found work as a pocket maker in a New York garment factory and became a foot soldier in America's army of labor, spending his life fighting for a living wage. Amalgam, a powerful limited edition artist's book, focuses on his dual role as a union member advocating for democracy in the workplace, and as a dictatorial patriarch of his Brooklyn family, waging a war against frivolity and toys. Jetter's images contrast old world ways with the desire to assimilate and follows the family and the union through the Great Depression and World War II to the 1960s, and the union's decline. A labor of love, Amalgam has been under construction for almost a decade, and is extraordinary among Jetter's extensive body of work, which includes prints, artist's books, and drawings focusing on political and socially significant subject matter. Her images have illustrated articles in the New York Times, The Washington Post, TIME, The Nation, the Village Voice, The Progressive, and others.

Caldecott Award-winning artist David Macaulay documents both his own family's immigration story and the state-of-the art ship that made high speed ocean travel possible in his recent book, Crossing on Time: Steam Engines, Fast Ships, and a Journey to a New World. The creator of the best-selling illustrated books, The Way Things Work, Cathedral, City, Castle, Ship, and many others, Macaulay brings his signature curiosity, in-depth research, and detailed observations to his own immigration story.



A plethora of studies, ship models, photographs, and more, trace his journey from England to the United States, as well as the unprecedented engineering project that culminated in the building of the most advanced steamship of its time - SS United States. The design and construction of the ship and the life of its designer, William Francis Gibbs, are fully explored, framed by Macaulay's own poignant tale, as he and his family crossed the Atlantic on this marvel of technology and engineering.

Leaving China, a memoir by James McMullan, is inspired by his World War II childhood, and the family's travels from China to India, Canada, and the United States. Born in Tsingtao, North China, the grandson of missionaries who settled there, he took life for granted until World War II erupted and his world dramatically changed. McMullan's father, a British citizen fluent in several Chinese dialects, joined the Allied forces. For the next several years, he and his mother moved from one place to another—Shanghai, San Francisco, Vancouver, Darjeeling—first escaping Japanese occupation then trying to find security, with no clear destination. Those ever-changing years took on the quality of a dream, a feeling that persists in his stunning watercolor paintings, which compliment a text that tells a remarkable story. McMullan's distinctive illustrations have appeared on the pages of virtually every American magazine, in best-selling picture books, and on the posters for more than seventy Lincoln Center theater productions.

In 1994, Yuyi Morales left her home in Xalapa, Mexico and came to the United States with her infant son, Kelly, leaving behind everything she owned. *Dreamers* tells the story of her difficult passage - Morales spoke no English at the time, but she found solace and inspiration in an unexpected place, a San Francisco public library. Book by book, she unraveled the language and customs of an unfamiliar new land and found ways to make a home within it. A celebration of what immigrants bring with them when they leave home, *Dreamers* is topical, timeless, and relevant as that status of immigrants become increasingly uncertain. #### **Papercuts by Rosa Leff**

ROM THE ARTIST: I have always enjoyed eating my way through new places. When I was in South Africa I ate biltong, dried kudu. When I was in Cuba I practically guzzled picadillo, a humble ground beef dish, without chewing, and drank guarapo, a fermented sugarcane drink, by the bucket. In Aruba I ate pastechis, little crescents of dough filled with cheese, literally every single day. But no matter how seasoned of a traveler you are, sometimes you just want a taste of home.

At the start of this year I moved to Puerto Rico. I'd been here more times than I could count and during each visit I looked forward to that first bite of octopus salad or that first suspiciously unrefrigerated crab empanada on the beach. But on our first day as residents, after the stress of flying with two chihuahuas and racing from store to store as they closed in search of air mattresses so we didn't have to spend our first night on the hard floor, we didn't go get rice and beans. We got Chinese food.

We didn't have to look at the menu to know we could order fried dumplings and an orange chicken combination platter because hole in the wall Chinese takeout spots are some of the most consistent independent restaurants in the world. That familiarity feels like a tight hug. As I took my last bite I thought about how good I was going to sleep on my Walmart air mattress now that my belly was full of fried rice.

The idea for this exhibit was born the moment I turned a corner in Mexico City and found myself face to face with that universal symbol – A Chinatown gate. I'd been traveling in Mexico for three weeks and having a wonderful time. I'd eaten escamoles, ant larvae and pupae, and eaten nearly every taco I came across. But once I saw the paper lanterns, bao buns, chubby panda illustrations, and piles of noodles, I felt something I can only describe as "home."

When I did actually travel in China all the sights and smells were somewhat familiar, but the tastes were unlike anything I'd experienced. After approaching a street vendor in the Muslim market, pointing at his skewers, and handing him money, I was laughed at before he kindly showed me how to dip my rice balls in the deep sauce bowl at the edge of his cart. One night we accidentally only ordered several small bowls of topping. Resigned to our fate of an inadequate dinner, we dug in. A stranger, realizing what was going on, summoned the chef, ordered us a bowl of biang biang noodles and taught us how to eat them.

Even in that noodle house, though we didn't speak the same language, and I didn't know how to eat the 3 foot long noodles, I was welcomed and made to feel at home. That stranger was so happy we'd made it to his town, a place Americans rarely visit, that he spent the whole evening hanging out and drinking with us. Without a word, we were welcomed to his life. We were welcomed home.

### BORDERLESS:

#### ARTIST MIGRATION FROM THE CMA COLLECTION

he Canton Museum of Art's collecting focus is American art, but what defines "American"? It is a diverse culture of many religions, ethnicities, and customs. Today, more than 40 million immigrants live in the United States, more than any other country. Global migration has taken place for centuries, dating all the way back to the 1700s, and America has seen waves of mass immigration.

With great triumph or great struggle, by choice or by force, in times of war and times of peace, humankind has crossed borders between countries. Artists were no exception to the traumatic events of their time, including forced expatriations caused by wars, revolutions, and racial or religious persecution, along with displacement due to economic and climate crises. Some, on the other hand, moved intentionally to pursue opportunities that could advance their artistic careers. Pulled from CMA's Permanent Collection, Borderless focuses on the stories of first and second generation American artists who crossed borders to get here. Each artist in Borderless represents resilience amidst the challenge of crossing borders, many of whom achieved great levels of success.

Regardless of what brought them to America, the artists in Borderless represent the strength and hope that kept them resilient as they resettled and assimilated to a new culture, while still maintaining their roots. For most of these artists, the move to America was a prosperous one, while others had a more difficult time adjusting. For many of these artists, America represented ideas of hope and freedom, in which they could follow their dreams and pursue artistic expression. In Borderless: Artist Migration from the CMA Collection, see how the global movement of people through migration, immigration, and displacement mobilized artists from all over to re-imagine ideas of home and place. Discover the stories and journeys of so many artists who have exemplified what it means to be Borderless.

arolyn Bradley was an accomplished watercolorist whose subjects included landscapes, seascapes, industrial scenes, and coastal views. She taught at Ohio State University from 1932 until her death in 1954. She was an avid traveler and fluent in Spanish, which earned her a place as an educational ambassador with the U.S. State Department from 1946-1951. Her first state-sponsored trip was as a visiting professor at the University of Chile, the second was a three-



month tour of Guatemala, Honduras, and Costa Rica. In 1950 she took a part-time teaching position at the Centre d'Art in Haiti, and in 1951 she was a visiting professor at the University of Costa Rica. On all of these trips she taught and lectured almost every day, to audiences that ranged from university students to primary school children.

Due to the economic situation in many places that she taught, materials were scarce. Bradley was known to take students up into the hills to dig their own clay to use for paint pigment; she also brought many art supplies with her to donate to her students. Because of her educational trips to South America, she became known at Ohio State University as the paintbrush ambassador. As the River Bends depicts one of Bradley's sojourns, where she took her students to gather clay. Her works often highlight bright, bold colors and provide a glimpse into some of her widespread travels.



rad Schwieger has been teaching at Ohio University since 1990, and has shown his ceramics nationally and internationally. Schwieger's artistic process is extensive and tedious, and his work is informed by his sincere interest in pottery, having done extensive research on folk pottery from the United States and Japan. While there are many elements at play in Schwieger's work, form is by far the most essential, followed by ways that will enhance and support the form, such as color and texture.

While traveling through Europe as a symposium artist in the early 2000s, Schwieger was deeply impressed by the eclectic architectural styles he encountered—from medieval buildings to the Art Nouveau and Neo-classicist styles of the 1930's. "I find an interesting parallel between architecture and pottery. Like

architecture, pottery deals with elements of form and structure, the interior and exterior, utility and containment, surface detail and adornment. I have attempted to synthesize these interests and produce work that shares the minimal and complex, the miniature and monumental, the formal elements of design, the implied and the possibility of actual function." Stacked Sculptural Form draws back to his travels and the architecture that inspired him.


