Let There Be Light!

New gallery lighting, that is! Underway as of this writing in late July is a transformational new lighting installation in the Museum's Gerry Bernhardt Education Gallery. Working with Hilscher-Clarke Electric, Lighting Dynamics Inc., and ERCO Lighting, a new system of units is being placed that will allow color changes and mood setting programming for art installations, thereby enhancing the visitor experience. It also brings greater energy efficiency and time-savings for our Curatorial Staff in exhibition design and changeovers. Our thanks to ArtsInStark and Visit Canton for grant support in this capital project.

New Fall Exhibitions

Our featured exhibition, *Family Album: Our Stories*, showcases Ohio native, Seattle-based artist Amy Pleasant, whose works tell an intimate story of the shared experience of family care taking, the influence of memory, generational transition, and the cost of care taking to women. It also asks the question all of us can relate to ... what becomes of us when there is no one to remember? As a part of the exhibition, the artist is creating a painting and a digital installation, using photos from the Stark County community as inspiration. A line-up of related education activities and events, to be announced, will further link how art expresses the complexities of human relationships. These are funded in part by Ohio Humanities, as well as the Stark Community Foundation and The Hoover Foundation.

In *Legacy: Getting to Give, Giving to Get*, Stark County artist Susan Mentrak explores family storytelling through large ceramic vessels. *Human/Nature* features Ron Isaacs' trompe l'oeil mixed media, which as he states stands halfway between painting and sculpture. His work with vintage clothing, plant materials, and found objects provide him "endless sources of composition and design."

From the CMA Collection, we give you *An American Journey: Watercolor Achievements*, highlighting works from Impressionism to Realism and beyond. Part of *An American Journey* is one of my personal favorite works from the Collection, "An Interesting Book" (1890, pictured above), by Claude Hirst. It made its own special American journey from Canton to Cologne, Germany, in 2018, and was seen by more than 90,000 people in the exhibition, *Once Upon a Time in America: Three Centuries of US-American Art*. I hope you will visit Canton to fully appreciate this journey and achievement in American art.

AMY PLEASANT

Family Albun_Our Stories

n this CMA original exhibition, *Family Album: Our Stories*, Amy Pleasant reflects the nostalgia of family moments, matriarchs, spaces and neighborhoods. Amy Pleasant is a Seattle figurative painter, born and raised in Ohio. Her work examines the most common of experiences—family, life transitions and generational change. Amy's early figurative paintings integrated shape and pattern and were rooted in vintage photographic images. More recent work incorporates less structured figures in the tradition of abstract expressionism, allowing the viewer freedom of interpretation. Her paintings provide a visual language, hinting at the complex navigation of human relationships. Embedded deeply in her practice and work as a visual artist is a belief that art in its most fundamental form is a personal expression and ultimately finds its rightful place through the engagement of the viewer.











FROM THE ARTIST:

Family is the most profound example of a universal primordial experience. It's a mixed bag, for sure, a marker of time, that which grounds us or disables us in ways that can follow us the whole of our lives. Everything about family continually changes, but memories linger. A curiosity arose about these notions of memory and generational transition with the juxtaposition of simultaneously raising my own children and caring for my mother and my aunt through aging and illness. Their deaths, a month apart, were preceded by the bestowal of the family albums. It was important for both of them to also pass down the details of names, places and stories behind each picture. I did not write them down, although in hindsight I wish I had as I have realized that time and distance mute the memory of those conversations.

This exploration inspired a broadening of focus beyond my own family. I was on the hunt for vintage photographs discarded at thrift shops and my yearly pilgrimage to the Hartville Flea Market. How was it that these photos were not carefully passed down from one generation to the next. These dusty, abandoned piles of pictures begged the question, "What becomes of us when there is no one to remember?" My efforts to animate, to embellish these strangers speak to our own longing to be remembered in some form or fashion.

As I collected more and more of these candid photos I was drawn to the women in these photos and the implied narratives revealed in a stance, a look, a hint of a difficult relationship. I was raised in a three generation household so there was something so familiar about these women. The paintings look behind the veil of their daily contributions, an implied narrative of the complexities, ambiguities and messiness of their vital role. Historically, women are the source of the stream from which we all flow. These paintings serve as a vehicle of remembrance, gratitude, redemption and closure.

It is natural that this series continues to unfold and expand. Embedded deeply in my practice and work as a visual artist is a belief that art in it most fundamental form is a personal expression and ultimately finds its rightful place through the engagement of the viewer in particular and the community at large. It is within this wider context that art is in its most powerful role. It not only reflects societal norms and transitions, but can assist in bringing vital change as well. It is time to invite others to join this exploration of the most common of experiences. As a part of the *Family Album: Our Stories* exhibition at the Canton Museum of Art I intend to make a large scale multiple panel painting and a digital installation using photos from the community as inspiration. These references will be inclusive of race and gender, to reflect the whole of the Stark County. My purpose as an artist is driven by the belief that art should be accessible to all. My hope is that this particular exhibition draws in individuals and families in under-served communities and provides an experience through observation, programming and education which inspires deeper understanding and appreciation of those whose shoulders we stand upon, an exposure to a visual language expressing the complex navigation of human relationships.

Amy Pleasant has participated in national exhibitions in Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles, and New York as well as solo exhibitions in Seattle and Amsterdam. In 2012 she was one of twelve artists featured nationally by the Woman's Caucus for the Arts and was a recipient of the Artist Trust Gap grant in 2016. In 2019 she attended the Blue Mountain Center, NY Artist and Writers Social Activism Residency and was accepted into the 2021 Chateau d'Orquevaux International Residency, France (rescheduled for 2022).

In addition to painting, Amy is a freelance writer and features reflecting the intersection of Art and Social Justice issues can be found at Huff Post and Bust Magazine.

HUMAN/NATURE:

THE TROMPE L'OEIL CONSTRUCTIONS OF RON ISAACS

he masterful trompe l'oeil work of Ron Isaacs is as charming as it is technically brilliant. Using birch plywood, select cutouts, and beautifully painted details which fool the eye, Isaacs creates compositions that pique your curiosity. A sense of surprise and appreciation is experienced when discovering his talent.

Trained as a painter, Isaacs's work now stands halfway between painting and sculpture. Beginning in about 1970, the paintings transformed a step at a time from a flat, rectangular picture to become irregularly shaped elaborate relief constructions fabricated completely from Finnish birch plywood painted in matte acrylics.

LEGACY: GETTING TO GIVE, GIVING TO GET

usan Mentrak is a ceramic artist and illustrator born and raised in Ohio. Susan graduated with a degree in Illustration from the Columbus College of Art and Design where she was greatly influenced by her instructors Lowell Tolstedt and Mark Hazlerig. Tolstedt taught her to pay attention to minutia and Hazlerig encouraged her to dream big and through art make the impossible possible. After adopting in 2003, she chose to devote much of her time to being a mom. However, her creative spirit never ceased.

She sewed clothes for her daughter and when she couldn't find fabric designs she liked, she learned how to design her own. She also posted dolls online that she made for her daughter. These were discovered by several publishers of doll magazines and collectors all over the world, and she has contributed to several books and magazines featuring her dolls.





In 2017, as she was working on a new doll, she wondered whether the materials she was using were sustainable. She decided to pursue learning ceramics to create porcelain dolls. She saw an advertisement on Facebook for a ceramic class at the Canton Museum of Art and registered. She was very nervous meeting people and found it extremely difficult to communicate after 4 years of self-isolation. Through the nurturing ceramic community at the Museum, she fell in love with ceramics and thrived in exploring her new creative medium.

The Canton Ceramic Artists Guild took her under their wing, exposing her to the science of clay, as well as encouraging her to pursue her ambitions. She is a member of the Canton Ceramic Artists Guild and the Ceramic Studio Manager at the Massillon Museum of Art.

An American Fourney

WATERCOLOR ACHIEVEMENTS FROM THE CMA COLLECTION

Ithough watercolor has been around for thousands of years, it drew little interest from mainstream painters in American art before 1867. Watercolor painting was not considered a "fine art" medium and was solely reserved for amateur artists, sketches, and studies hidden from the public eye. That changed with the founding of the American Watercolor Society in 1866, which was incredibly instrumental in promoting the medium and educating artists and collectors of its worth.

The Society boasted infamous members such as Childe Hassam, Edward Hopper, Winslow Homer, Edward Potthast, and Charles Burchfield, among others. As a result, by the turn of the century, watercolor became known as the "American medium." With this revitalization,

by the mid-1880s, watercolor painting flourished, and nearly every major American oil painter was also working in watercolor.

Over the last several decades, the Canton Museum of Art has built a thorough and extensive collection of works by some of the most celebrated watercolor artists—fitting, as watercolor painting has been part of the artistic tradition within Ohio for centuries. In fact, in the 1920s, Cleveland, Ohio, surpassed Boston as the country's leading center in watercolor painting. Ohio became a state filled with booming artistic colonies which produced thousands of paintings and cultivated generations of notorious watercolor painters such as Edward Potthast and Charles Burchfield. Outside of Ohio, with the rise in the popularity of watercolor painting in the United States following the creation of the American Watercolor Society, a new set of artists emerged as stars, including Winslow Homer and John Singer Sargent.

An important subsection of watercolor painters, women had long been working in the medium before it was accepted as a professional art form, though their work was considered a "decorative hobby." The American Watercolor Society had strict requirements for their membership, yet in a radical move allowed women to join. The Society

wanted to attract high-quality members, but ironically many top painters hesitated to join, because women had been allowed membership.

Though they encountered resistance, many women still managed to paint and pave the way for the success of future generations. Alice Schille and Jane Peterson, for example, excelled as some of the most well-known and accomplished women watercolor painters.

Watercolor is rooted in tradition and history in America and remains an important medium due to its never-ending ability to capture daily life in dazzling ways. *An American Journey* follows the path of watercolor history in the United States through our Museum's Permanent Collection, featuring numerous important artists who helped to elevate and revolutionize the medium.

lessandro Gallo is a contemporary artist renowned for his anthropomorphic, hybrid sculptures. His ceramics are half-animals, half-humans, highlighting the link between the human and animal worlds. Although these figures are surreal, they are also rooted in realism and set in familiar contexts, often engaged in everyday tasks such as riding the subway. In his own words, "I represent the silent life happening around me using human/animal hybrids. Different species clash, coexist, and reinforce each other in familiar scenes. They mirror the theater of random interactions we experience everyday. Sense of humor softens the harsh edges of judgment and creates a necessary distance from an emotionally charged scene."

Gallo lives in Helena, Montana and is a long-term artist in residence at the Archie Bray Foundation.

Gently Down the Stream is a depiction of a seemingly relaxed setting —a half-human, half-bird couple sitting on a couch across from a note-taking frog-woman. Closer examination reveals the couple's wedding bands and a box of tissues residing on the table before them. Inspired by Gallo's own experience with couple's therapy during his marriage, the figures' close proximity to each other masks a great emotional distance that is currently trying to be bridged. The title adds the idea of an unstoppable current moving us all.



.V. Kelley is a non-binary artist from the San Francisco Bay Area. They make figurative ceramic work that explores ideas about the potential of gender outside of the binary through the hybridized animal/human as metaphor, with references to fantasy and science fiction. Kelley uses fantastical creatures to develop their own personal mythologies, metaphorically challenging the boundaries and binaries of identity.

"I make figurative ceramic sculptures portraying creatures that are a blend of human and animal. These forms are gendered outside of the socialized binary of male and female. *Moonlit Dreamers* explores how science fiction and fantasy can be used as a platform to open a discussion about the gray areas of gender identity. This interaction often sparks trans-formative conversations and creates visibility

For over 50 years Canton Fine Arts Associates, an affiliate of the Canton Museum of Art has hosted Christkindl Markt, a premier juried fine arts and crafts show and beloved holiday tradition for Canton, Stark County, and the region.



The history of Christkindl Markt started in December 1970 with a Christmas Bazaar, the first ever held in the new Cultural Center. Canton Fine Arts members made all the items for sale and guests were invited. A profit of \$1000 was realized. The Bazaar continued for the next several years, and in 1972 the entire concept was changed and given a new name, Christkindl Markt. Outside craftsmen were invited to participate, the event was open to the public and for the first-time admission tickets were sold. The first Christkindl Markt made a profit of \$5000. Over the past 50 years Christkindl has been able to raise over \$2.5 million to benefit the Canton Museum of Art.



This year's Markt will feature over 80 artisans with talents ranging from jewelry, ceramics, pottery, photography, glass, metal, fibers/wearables, holiday items and much more. A special addition to this year's Markt in celebration of the 50th Anniversary, will be a Golden Ticket Raffle –basket filled with goodies with a value of over \$300. Other offerings will include The Sweet Shoppe, Basket Raffle, Silent Auction, Book Sale and a \$1000 shopping spree Door Prize provided by Andreas Furniture.
